Dear Administrator Zeldin,

As Members of Congress, we urge the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to immediately retract its proposal, announced on June 11, 2025, to weaken Mercury and Air Toxics Standards (MATS)¹. Should the agency refuse to retract the rule, EPA should provide 75 days for comment and hold multiple public hearings. 55 days for public comment and one public hearing is simply insufficient for EPA to understand the gravity of the impact this regulatory abandonment will have on communities.

It is the mission of EPA to protect human health and the environment. To achieve these goals, Congress gave EPA authority under the Clean Air Act to regulate hazardous air pollutants, like mercury and arsenic from power plants. Rolling back the MATS rule is a cruel abandonment of the agency's statutory obligations that will endanger children's health, harm communities, and let the worst industrial polluters off the hook.

Coal-fired power plants emit mercury² and other toxic pollutants, poisoning the air and water, and particularly impacting those living on the fenceline and downwind of these facilities. Mercury pollution harms infants and children by causing permanent brain damage with long-term harms such as development delays, learning disabilities, and birth defects³. Due to environmental injustice, communities of color and low-income communities are more likely to live near coal-fired power plants and be exposed to this dangerous pollution⁴. As mercury pollution settles into waterways and streams, communities that rely on fish from those local waterways as a dietary staple, including Indigenous communities, would also experience higher levels of mercury exposure from these facilities should this rule be rolled back.

Standards limiting mercury and air toxics pollution have been successful in reducing mercury pollution from power plants by 90%, as well as having additional benefits of decreasing other dangerous air pollutants⁵. The 2024 MATS rule was projected to achieve \$300 million in health benefits over a decade⁶—benefits that would be stripped away with the proposed rollback.

The goal of EPA should be to reduce hazardous air pollution, like mercury emissions, by the maximum extent possible. The standards set by the 2024 rule for mercury and air toxics pollution are not only achievable⁷, but the majority of power plants were either already meeting them or only required small changes to comply. Weakening these commonsense standards would allow for the worst of the worst industrial polluters to ratchet up their hazardous emissions. The Trump Administration is already giving out free passes for power plants to pollute⁸ and concealing the process for granting exemptions from the public, allowing some of the biggest corporate polluters to increase toxic air pollution into nearby communities without accountability.

The rollback of the MATS rule is part of the Trump Administration's deregulatory, Polluters First Agenda attacking dozens of climate and health protections with deadly and costly consequences. An Associated Press study estimates that eliminating more than 30 EPA protections that protect our air, water, and climate would cost \$275 billion dollars and more than 30,000 lives lost each year. Weakening the MATS rule, along with eliminating safeguards protecting communities from soot and smog pollution, would increase coal-related deaths by 10,000 each year⁹.

By rolling back the MATS rule, the Trump Administration is choosing corporate polluters over the health and lives of everyday Americans across the country. We implore you to keep our communities and the environment safe from health-harming pollution by stopping this reckless rollback, extending the comment period to 75 days to allow for meaningful public engagement, and committing to holding multiple public hearings to allow affected fenceline communities ample opportunities to be heard in this process.
