A BILL

To amend title 10, United States Code, to prohibit discrimination in the Armed Forces.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- **SECTION 1. FINDINGS.**
- 4 Congress finds the following:
- 5 (1) Women, Black, Native American, and
- LGBTQIA+ Americans have served in the Armed 6
- 7 Forces since the Revolutionary War.
- 8 (2) In 1948, 16 years before the enactment of
- 9 the Civil Rights Act (Public Law 88–352; 78 Stat.

1	241), which desegrated civilian spaces, President
2	Truman issued Executive Order 9981, which allowed
3	Black members of the Armed Forces to serve side-
4	by-side with white members.
5	(3) In 1948, President Truman signed the
6	Women's Armed Services Integration Act (Public
7	Law 80-625; 62 Stat. 356) into law, officially allow-
8	ing women to serve as full, permanent members of
9	each Armed Force.
10	(4) In 1967, President Johnson signed into law
11	Public Law 90–130, which authorized the promotion
12	of women to the ranks of general and flag officers.
13	(5) In 1972, women were allowed to command
14	units that included men.
15	(6) In 1982, the Department of Defense In-
16	struction 1332.14, "Enlisted Administrative Separa-
17	tions", banned homosexual individuals from serving
18	in the Armed Forces.
19	(7) In 1993, President Clinton signed into law
20	the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal
21	Year 1994 (Public Law 103–16), which enacted sec-
22	tion 654 of title 10, United States Code, "Policy
23	concerning homosexuality in the armed forces", com-
24	monly known as "Don't Ask, Don't Tell".

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(8) In 2011, President Obama signed into law

2	the "Don't Ask, Don't Tell Repeal Act of 2010", al-
3	lowing homosexual members to openly serve in the
4	Armed Forces.
5	(9) In 2015, the last remaining policy restric-
6	tions on women serving in direct combat roles were
7	removed.
8	(10) In 2021, President Biden issued Executive
9	Order 13988, which rescinded the policy that prohib-
10	ited transgender individuals from serving in the
11	Armed Forces.
12	(11) It should be the policy of the United
13	States that every member of the Armed Forces has
14	the right to serve, advance, and be evaluated based
15	on only individual merit, fitness, capability, and per-
16	formance, in an environment free of discrimination
17	on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion
18	sex, gender identity, or sexual orientation.
19	SEC. 2. NONDISCRIMINATION IN THE ARMED FORCES.
20	Chapter 49 of title 10, United States Code, is amend-
21	ed by inserting after section 985 the following new section
22	"§ 986. Prohibition on discrimination
23	"(a) Prohibition.—(1) Subject to paragraph (2)
24	discrimination within the Department of Defense against

1	an individual on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, na-
2	tional origin, gender identity, or sexual orientation.
3	"(2) A qualification established or applied regarding
4	eligibility for service in an armed force shall take into ac-
5	count only the ability of an individual to meet—
6	"(A) general occupational standards for mili-
7	tary service; and
8	"(B) the particular military occupational spe-
9	cialty.
10	"(b) Definitions.—In this section:
11	"(1) The term 'gender identity' means the gen-
12	der-related identity, appearance, mannerisms, or
13	other gender-related characteristics of an individual,
14	regardless of the individual's designated sex at birth.
15	"(2) The term 'sex' includes—
16	"(A) a sex stereotype;
17	"(B) pregnancy, childbirth, or a related
18	medical condition;
19	"(C) sex characteristics, including intersex
20	traits.
21	"(3) The term 'sex stereotype' includes—
22	"(A) stereotypical notions of masculinity or
23	femininity;
24	"(B) an expectation of how an individual
25	represents or communicates their gender to oth-

1	ers through behavior, clothing, hairstyle, activ-
2	ity, voice, mannerism, or body characteristic;
3	"(C) the expectation that an individual will
4	consistently identify with only one gender; and
5	"(D) an expectation regarding the appro-
6	priateness of a role for a certain sex.".
